EDITORIAL POLICY - BLOGS

The blogs are reviewed through a blinded process wherein three-member panels of editors, pass or fail articles on simple majority after submission of their individual reviews and on the basis of set criteria. Authors are responsible for the accuracy of statements, and accuracy and adequacy of the references made in his/her articles. The responsibility to obtain permission to use any copyrighted or any unpublished work is on the author and should be in writing.

Manuscripts submitted by the authors are to be evaluated on the basis of the following criteria:

- Plagiarism: We take the issue of plagiarism seriously. The threshold for acceptable similarity is 15%. Any article found to be exceeding the limit will be summarily rejected. However, the quotes from the cases and the wordings of the statute would not be counted to be plagiarized content.
- 2. **Novelty & Relevancy**: Under this criterion, the evaluation is on the ground of the originality of the idea and novelty in the arguments as put forth by the author. It is preferred that the topic of the article is contemporaneous nature, however, a novel take on issues are also welcome.
- 3. Language & Grammar: The clarity of thought and argument, including the overall structure of the article, play an important role in finally deciding on the acceptance of the article. The manner and style of writing of the authors are also vital in the process of evaluation.

Once the panel decides that an article is fit for publication, the editors will work in a collaborative manner with the author to suggest changes on the aforementioned criteria, including but not limited to:

- 1. **Arguments**: This involves finding possible flaws in the arguments made in the article, including lack of coherence, and consistency as a whole with respect to the entire article, and then make necessary changes, if any.
- 2. **Citations & Source-Pulling**: This includes reviewing whether all citations are in the prescribed style and correcting them if any errors exist. Also, the editors will verify the sources that have been mentioned in the article to check if they are actually what they're supposed to be, and related to what is being substantiated by then.

3. **Language, Grammar & Spellchecks**: This includes identifying and correcting grammatical and spelling errors generally, and also includes correcting punctuation mistakes, redrafting incorrect usages, informal usages, etc.
